## Identifying and Dating Your Photographs:

- What large features are in the photo, e.g. buildings, scenery, vehicles?



- Are there street signs or business names?
- Does the photo have a photographer's name or address listed?
- What type of material is the photo? e.g. Tin Type, Cart de Visite, Color Print...
- What style of clothing are people wearing?
- Tax stamps were used during the Civil War 1863-1865.
- Once you have narrowed down a time period & location you can begin to identify the subjects in the photo.

## Themes and Trends in Photography:



- Clothing styles change by decade:
  - Full skirts and button down jackets in the 1860s
  - White button-down shirts and puffy sleeves in the 1910s
  - Straight skirts and long strands of beads in the 1920s
- Examine hats, bonnets and jewelry

## Props and Backgrounds:

- Photographer's backgrounds & props are a great way to tie photos together or to a particular time and studio.
- Look for identical items: chairs, tables, cloth, curtains

## Eras:



- Tin Types 1855-1885
- Diamonds were popular @ 1895
- Carte de Visite (Cabinet Cards) 1860s-1910s
- Picture Postcards 1900-1920s
- Rectangular portraits were a popular style @ 1910-1925
- Art Deco revival cardboard enclosures @ 1940-1950s
- Polaroid 1948-1962 1963- (3 distinct eras)

## Active Seeing:



- What type of photograph do you have?
- What is the physical condition?
- What type of photo is it? Studio portrait or candid?
- What do you see in the background?
- How many people are in the picture?
